NOTES

The crew shall give twenty four hours notice before leaving or otherwise forfit a days pay and the crew shall be entitle to twenty four hours notice before being discharged. Any member of the crew loosing his passage shall be considered as a deserter and shall forfit his claims to the ship and wages due to him, and the crew shall individual pay any fine incurred by them through neglect of Post in harbour Regulation Tide Watch Lights or smoking X Cetra and the crew mutule to assist in working and coaling the ship when required.



The 'Volante' was built in 1884 by McIlwaine Lewis, Belfast; Yard No. 21 and originally named 'Theme'; owned by W. A. Grainger, Belfast. Total tonnage 332; LPP 48.5; Beam 7.0; Built of Iron; Powered by one screw shaft and a 2 cylinder compound engine

In 1889 the 'Theme' was sold to Volana Shipbuilding Co Ltd, Liverpool who renamed the ship 'Volante'. In 1913 the 'Volante' was sold to John Kelly Limited, Belfast who renamed the ship 'Cultra', and in 1914 the 'Cultra' was sold back to W. A. Grainger, Belfast who renamed the ship 'Theme', and in 1915 sold the 'Theme' to Antrim Iron Ore Co Ltd, Belfast who renamed the ship 'Glengan'.

The 'Glenaan' was wrecked of Torlinn Point, South Arran on the 21 January 1932 carrying ballast from Belfast to Glasgow.
